Announcer: Yesterday in New Orleans, District Judge Edward Haggerty ordered attorneys for Clay Shaw and ordered District Attorney Jim Garrison to refrain from making public statements about the pending trial of Shaw on charges of conspiring to murder John F. Kennedy. Mark Lane, a critic of the Warren Commission's investigation of the assassination, is in New Orleans and has been meeting with Garrison. An advertisement in a current broadcasting publication says Lane is in New Orleans to gather material for a syndicated radio program. Apparently, Lane has gotten information not made public. After meeting today with Jim Garrison, Mark Lane told ABC:

Lane: We exchanged a great deal of information. We'll be meeting every day and every evening for the rest of this week. And I've already met with some of the members of his staff as well. He has presented his whole theory, his case, to me. He has also showed me the evidence on which it is based. And I am convinced that the case is a very strong case, that he has a remarkable amount of detailed proof.

Announcer: There has been no word from Judge Edward Haggerty about whether Lane's ~~syndicated~~ syndicated radio program and his private sessions with Jim Garrison are compatible, or in violation of his order.

Announcer: ... will rock
