

JFK Probers Reindict Man On Perjury

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The grand jury backing Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's Kennedy assassination probe had reindicted Dean A. Andrews Jr. for perjury.

By contrast to the original indictment, which merely accused Andrews of lying under oath, the new one cited 2,000 words of his March 16 testimony before the grand jury.

Five counts of perjury were cited against Andrews, a suspended assistant district attorney in adjoining Jefferson Parish (county) who figured briefly in the Warren commission report.

Reindictment by the Orleans Parish Grand Jury came after Andrews' lawyer moved that the first one be quashed because it was not specific in saying where Andrews allegedly lied.

Garrison's office also filed two new charges against Gordon Novel, wanted as a material witness.

The charges, which bolster an attempt to extradite Novel from Columbus, Ohio, accused him of two 1966 thefts totaling about \$2,430. He was free on bond after being arrested in a Columbus suburb on a warrant resulting from Garrison's first charge—conspiracy to burglarize an oil company's explosives storage bunker near Houma, La.

Garrison also has moved to have Lillie McMaines, the former Sandra Moffett, brought back here from Omaha, Neb., where she now lives. Legal action started in Omaha yesterday.

New Orleans Jury Re-indicts Probe Figure

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Dean Adams Andrews Jr., a Warren Commission witness who said he occasionally represented Lee Harvey Oswald on legal matters, was re-indicted for perjury Wednesday by the Orleans Parish grand jury.

The new indictment specified five counts of perjury and cited about 2,000 words of his testimony March 16 before the grand jury.

Most of the testimony dealt with Andrews' encounter with a Clay Bertrand in 1963. He told the Warren Commission that Bertrand telephoned him after the assassination of President John F. Kennedy asking that he represent Oswald.

Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison contends that Clay Ber-

trand was an alias used by Clay L. Shaw, retired director of the International Trade Mart, charged with conspiring to murder President Kennedy.

The testimony cited in the re-indictment quoted Andrews, when asked if he could identify Shaw as Bertrand: "I can't say he is and I can't say he ain't."

In a related development, Garrison's office filed two theft charges against Gordon Novel, former New Orleans bar owner now in Columbus, Ohio.

Garrison wants Novel as a material witness in his conspiracy probe.
