GARRISON ANSWERS ATTORNEY FOR RUBY

District Attorney Jim Garrison of New Orleans said yesterday that the attorney for the late Jack L. Ruby wanted him disbarred because he "knows that I am going to connect Ruby with the conspiracy" to assassinate President Kennedy.

The attorney, Sol Dann of Detroit, asked the American and Louisiana Bar Associations on Friday to consider disbarring Mr. Garrison for "unwarranted and reckless attacks on the Warren Commission Report and its members."

Mr. Garrison made his remarks in a televised interview on "Local Issue," shown by The American Broadcasting Company.

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Mr. Garrison also said that he would "defer" any further arrests in his investigation into the assassination.

"But there will be other arrests, and they will probably be before the trial," he said. The trial he referred to is that of Clay L. Shaw, a New Orleans businessman, who has been indicted on charges of participating in a conspiracy to kill President Kennedy. No date has been set for the trial.

Mr. Dann became Ruby's attorney after Ruby was convicted of killing Lee Harvey Oswalç, President Kennedy's assasssin. In a letter to the bar groups, he described Mr. Garrison's investigation as an "exploitation of this horrible tragedy."
