NEW ORLEANS AP - Pist. Atty. Jim Garrison has accused the National Broadcasting Co. of interfering with his investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kennely, the Times-Picayune said funday.

In a letter to the Federal Communications Commussion, Garrison unset that NBC not be allowed "to use the public air waves to accomplish such mean ends," the newspaper states. In New York, a spokesman for NBC said it had no comment. Garrison, who spoke to a New York district attorneys meeting in Monticello, N.Y., saturday night, could not be reached immediately.

In Washington, the FCC said it had not received the letter.

NBC announced it will air a program monday night saying that two principal witnesses in Garrison's cale against Clay L. Shaw, retired New Orleans businessman, had previously failed lie detector tests.

The network said Shaw was held for trial on a charge of conspiring to assassinate konnelly largely because of the testimony of the witnesses, Vernon Bundy and Porry Russo.

Carrison's letter to Rosel H. Hyde, chairman of the ECC, charged that NBC had cone beyond "the pretense of merely gathering and disseminating the news," the Times-Picayune said.

The district attorney said the network's actions made him believe that destruction of his case was nbc's "calculated abjective," the paper added.

District Attorney Jim Garrison has accused NBC of interfering with his investigation of the assassination of President Kennedy, the Times-Picayune said yesterday.
