

18 Months for Kennedy

Criminal District Court Judge Frank Shea sentenced Dean Andrews yesterday to 18 months in jail for perjury.

Andrews was released under \$2500 bond pending appeal.

Andrews was convicted last Monday on three counts of perjury. He was accused of lying to the grand jury investigating District Attorney Jim Garrison's claim that a conspiracy was hatched in New Orleans to kill President John F. Kennedy.

Shea sentenced Andrews to 18 months on each count, the sentences to run concurrently.

Before pronouncing sentence, the judge denied Andrews' plea for a new trial.

Shaw was charged by Garrison with conspiring to murder President Kennedy. He is free on bond.

The District Attorney claims Shaw used Clay Bertrand as an alias. Shaw denied this.

Andrews, 44, formerly an assistant district attorney in suburban Jefferson parish, told the Warren Commission that a voice he knew as Clay Bertrand telephoned him after President Kennedy was slain Nov. 22, 1963 in Dallas, Texas, and asked him to go to the Texas city and represent Lee Harvey Oswald, named by the Warren Commission as Kennedy's assa-

ANDREWS SENTENCED IN NEW ORLEANS CASE

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 18 (UPI)—Dean Andrews Jr. was sentenced yesterday to 18 months in prison for perjury in connection with District Attorney Jim Garrison's investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy.

District Judge Frank Shea sentenced Andrews to 18-month concurrent sentences on three counts of lying before the Orleans Parish [County] grand jury. Andrews was convicted on Monday.

His lawyers plan to appeal the verdict to the State Supreme Court.

Andrews, who is free on \$2,500 bond, told the grand jury he could not identify Clay L. Shaw, a businessman, as Clay Bertrand, a man he said asked him to represent Lee Harvey Oswald, the assassin of President Kennedy.

Andrews is a lawyer.
