Police said Young and Grey were killed by bul-lets from the same .22-caliber pistol, and blamed the slayings on a gang of Algiers toughs.

'Thrills' or 'Gangland'?

In less than two months there have been five vicious slayings, apparently connected, within the metropolitan community. Two of the victims were taxi drivers who worked for the same company based in New Orleans.

The first of the five victims, a Negro man, was shot to death by someone in a passing car. The two other victims were Ronald Rodrigue, 19, of Algiers, and Walter E. Poole Jr., 22, of Metairie, who was found shot, his body apparently rolled over by a car, in St. Bernard Parish last Friday.

All of the victims had been shot with a .22-caliber pistol, police said.

Law enforcement officers have voiced belief the slayings are connected. New Orleans police have called them teenage "thrill killings." But Sheriff Jack Rowley of St. Bernard Parish disagrees.

"This is not just a bunch of teenagers killing for a thrill. There is something sinister behind it," Sheriff Rowley said last Friday after Poole's body had been found. The sheriff said he saw some other "pattern" to the slayings.

But what is that pattern? And what is behind it? Also, what does Sheriff Rowley mean by sinister?

The fact that the three earlier suspects were still behind bars when Poole's body was found does not lend credence to the thrill-kill theory. St. Bernard investigators described the slaying of Poole as "gangland style." This seems to imply deliberate execution by mob-

Investigators in the three parishes concerned are not, we trust, pursuing their own pet theories to the neglect of other plausible ones.

We trust that lawmen in the three parishes are in full cooperation in an effort to apprehend those responsible for these heinous and disconcerting crimes.
