Attorney Delayed

Partin Won't Testify at O'Hara Probe

Baton Rouge Teamster boss Edward Grady Partin said today he would not answer questions before a Louisiana Supreme Court commission looking into alleged wrongdoings by Criminal District Judge Malcolm V. O'Hara until he could be represented by his attorney.

Partin showed up at the hearing this morning with four friends, but without an attorney.

When the commission hearing broke for lunch, Partin, who was the principal witness in the prosecution of Teamster boss James A. Hof-fa, still had not testified. Partin's testimony was instrumental in getting Hoffa convicted of jury tampering.

PARTIN SAID HE was to have been represented by an attorney from Washington, D. C., but the man could not make it because of sickness in his family.

Asked if he wasn't afraid he would run into trouble for not answering questions, Par-

"If you see me walking out of there with handcuff on, you'll know. . . . ''

"I DON'T THINK I should answer questions anywhere without an attorney," said Partin. "I don't intend to answer questions without an attorney." attorney.

The only witness questioned this morning was Judge O'Hara himself. It was learned that O'Hara will probably be on the stand in the

closed-door hearing for some time before anyone else is called.

The procedure is for the state to question the witness. If there is an objection from the witness' attorney, the commissioner, Michael M. Ir-

O'HARA WAS EXPECTED to testify for most of the day today.

Partin was asked if he was surprised to see Zachary "Red" Strate at the hearing. He said:
"Yes, I was. I understood

he was in Florida."

Strate, one of the builders of the Fontainebleau Motel here, was an associate of Hoffa and was subsequently convicted with him on a fraud charge. Hoffa is now in a federal prison in West Virginia serving time on the jury

tampering conviction.

Partin also said he was "mildly surprised" to see District Attorney Jim Garrison at the hearing.

PARTIN SAID HE had a 'general conversation" with Strate in the witness room about the presidential race, the recent Democratic pri-mary, "nothing specific."

Strate and Partin have been on opposite sides in the Hoffa controversy

Partin said the witnesses were under orders not to discuss the O'Hara case.

On another matter, Partin said he believes the Labor-Management Com mission hearings scheduled to begin shortly in Baton Rouge are "illegal. I think the commission is illegal."

HE SAID THE commission hearings would prove nothing.

ON MAY 3, the court will hold a trial on the state's suit to remove Judge O'Hara from office.

·Strate has reportedly been living in Miami and was therefore out of the court's jurisdiction. Garrison has never previously figured in the case involving Judge O'Hara.
