

Jury to See Kennedy Murder Film

New Orleans

Life magazine has agreed to let a New Orleans grand jury view the original copy of a color movie of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, Assistant District Attorney James L. Alcock said yesterday.

The movie will be shown to the Grand Jury, which is making its own inquiry into the Kennedy murder, later this week, Alcock said.

District Attorney Jim Garrison issued a subpoena last week for the movie, made by Dallas businessman Abraham Zapruder and later purchased by Life.

Garrison contends that the movie shows Kennedy was shot from the front.

The Warren Commission, which concluded that Kennedy was killed by two shots from the rear, did not view the original film copy, Garrison said yesterday.

Meanwhile, lawyers here began oral arguments on a defense request to move the impending assassination conspiracy trial of Clay Shaw to a place at least 100 miles from New Orleans.

Bobby Backs The Warren Commission

Los Angeles

Senator Robert F. Kennedy said yesterday he supports the conclusions of the Warren commission that Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone, was the assassin of his brother, President Kennedy.

Kennedy told students at San Fernando Valley State College that he does not favor immediate openings of the commission's archives although he said the records "will be opened at the appropriate time."

He said, "No one is more interested than I in knowing the facts of the assassination."

"If I were President of the United States, I would not reopen the Warren Commission report. I have seen everything that is in the archives. I stand by the Warren Commission report."
