NEW ORLEANS (NEA) — If you like James Bond, you'll love the Garrison Case, except that if you accept its main thesis, it is much more compelling and frightening.

To file the conspiracy according to Jim Garrison in its al-phabetical perspective, you need only three initials: "CIA."

At the crux of the Garrison answer to who killed John F. Kennedy at Dallas in 1963, there are three principal ingredients. 1. Elements of the Central In-

telligence Agency. 2. Right-wing extremists who hated Kennedy for what they considered his coddling of inter-

national communism. 3. A handful of anti-Casi

ban activists who loathed Kennedy because they blamed him for bungling the Bay of Pigs and came to distrust him further after the Cuban Missile Crisis of late 1962.

Garrison, himself a states righter and moderate conservative, blames the assassination of Kennedy, not on a Com-munist as the Warren Commission did, but on a growing band of right-wing radicals inside and



son added in an interview with Newspaper Enterprise Associ-ation that his office has been able to "establish without con-tradication" that Lee Harvey Oswald was never a Communist or a confused left-leaning youth, as the Warren Commission said.

More specifically, Garrison said he will show that Oswald worked for the Central Inte-ligence Agency and that his "Communist pose was nothing but a front for other activities."

* * * In fact, said Garrison, Oswald helping anti-Castro miliwas tants by "playing the role of a hired Communist and presenting a tangible, clear and presenting danger upon which the anti-Cas-tro' sympathizers could base their appeals for money and arms."

When the shots were fired in Dealey Plaza on Nov. 22, 1963, he said, Oswald "probably did not shoot anyone."

"Ultimately, he was the fall guy who took the rap and was eliminated by Jack Ruby, who was serving the same cause in Dallas."

Then if Oswald was not the asassin, who was? And why were they not detected?

To this question, Garrison produced a set of photographs.

of three, The first, a series shows a man with blond hair and white socks, leaning down to pick up something on the South side of Elm Street. Behind him is the Texas School Book epository, the electric clock on roof showing the time as 12:40 — 20 minutes after the assassination.

* * There is a blowup of that photograph, made by Garrison's office from the negative, depicting 伯伯 reaching hand of the man with blond hair. Garrison identitied several dark smudges on the grass below the reaching hand as the brain tissue and the g hand blood of John Kennedy. In front of those smudges is a square-based object with an eliptical head.

"That is a .45 caliber armor-plercing bullet," the Dis-unct Attorney said. "It may be the bullet which blew off John

Kennedy's head. "You'll notice in the third pic-ture," he said, "that the blond man is turning away with his first clenched as if he is holding

something." According to the Warren Commission report, both Kennedy, and Texas Gov. John Connally were struck by 6.5 millimeter slugs from a Mannlicher Cardepository. There is no mention of 45s. Garrison said the blond man

"He was, when he went to in the photograph is a government agent whose identity his office has established.

"Since there was never any mention of finding that slug," Garrison said, "we can only conclude the man in the picture was part of a cleanup squad assigned to suppress evidence." 颇新 * *

If there were shots other than those from the School Book Depository, who fired them and from what vantage points?

"The preponderant majority of witnesses questioned in Dealey Plaza after the assassina-ion," Garrison said, "concluded that the shots came from the north side of the Dealey Plaza in the vicinity of the grassy knoll.

"There is the stockade fence there which offers a perfect vantage point. And there is a storm sewer, which is almost like a pillbox. A man can stand up in it and have a perfect view of a passenger in a passing convertible."

But, if there were other assassins, what happened to them? Here, Garrison produced two more photographs.

One showed two men in the company of police officers, who apparently were placing them inside a squad car. The other depicted two men being led into what Garrison said was the sheriff's office of Dallas County.

"There were 10 men arrested in a freight car behind the ar-cade near the grassy knoll," he said. "Those are four of them, Why don't you ask the Dallas police what happened to them."

Inquiries at Dallas produced little result. A spokesman for the Dallas police and the Dallas County sheriff's office said there was no record of the men ar-rested that day. Neither is there a record of the men being questioned. The Warren Commission did not mention them. * *

"We have established that were all released as soon they as Officer Tippett was killed and Oswald was arrested," Garrison said. "Yet, now we know who some of them are, and we know they were involved."

The final question, then, is what was the motive for Kennedy's murder, especially if ele-ments of the CIA were involved? "This is difficult for Ameri-
