28 MAY CE lin Ordered To Pay \$15,000 To Ex-Member

WASHINGTON (AP) - The National Labor Relations Board has ordered Edward G. Partin, a Baton Rouge Teamsters Union leader, to pay more than \$15,000 to a black-listed former union membed.

The NLRB said Partin, still under indictment charging embezzlement of union money blacklisted union member Cal-vin G. Clary and got him fired for raising questions about Par-

tin's handling of union funds.

CLARY HAS been trying to collect from Partin, whose testimoney helped imprison Team-sters President James R. Hoffa, since the board first ruled

against Partin four years ago.
Clary was part of a faction in
a Baton Rouge Teamsters local which tried to oust Partin as business agent on grounds of mishandling of funds and mistreating union members.

The NLRB in its summary

judgment order yesterday, said Partin had ignored previous orders to pay Clary, including a U.S. Court of Appeals decision upholding the back-pay order.

The board ordered Partin to pay Clary \$13,555 plus interest for loss of pay, \$403 interest for medical expenses Clary would have been entitled to as a union member, and \$1,125 in payments to the Teamsters' pension fund for Clary

THE EMBEZZLEMENT charges have been pending against Partin since 1962, two years before he showed up as star federal witness in Hoffa's

1964 jury tampering trial.

Hoffa was convicted and is serving an eight-year sentence at the Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary.

A federal judge in Baton Rouge earlier this month refused to dismiss the embezzlement charges against Partin and accused the Justice Department of making a deal-the partment of making a deal to pay off Partin for his testimony against Hoffa.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., was attorney general at the time of Hoffa's trial.

"ARE THE interests of justice

to be served by granting of life-time immunity to someone be-cause of the wishes of a pre-vious attorney geseral?" asked U.S. Dist. Judge E. Gordon West at the Baton Rouge hear-ing. Friday. May 3

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Justice Department attorney
Michael Epstein denied at the
hearing that Partin had been hearing that Partin had been given immunity, but asked that the embezzlement charges be dismissed "in the interests of justice" because Partin helped in the Hoffa trial.

"If that isn't a payoff, I don't know what it is," West said in refusing to dismiss the 26-count indictment accusing Partin of embezzlement and falsifying un-

embezzlement and falsifying union records.
