DA Defies Order by

District Attorney Garrison today ordered members of his staff to disobey the federal court order directing them to answer questions from attorneys for accused conspirator Clay L. Shaw.

In a letter to his staff members, Garrison instructed his asistants to tell Shaw's attorneys nothing other than their names, office ranks and Social Security numbers.

THE DA SAID the action of the federal courts blocking the scheduled trial of Shaw next Tuesday on a charge of conspiring to kill President Kennedy in 1963 is "plainly illegal and no member of this staff is to compromise or co-operate in any way with this totalitarian display of power by the federal government." In granting Shaw's attorneys a temporary restraining or-der postponing the trial, the court also authorized Shaw's lawyers to take depositions from members of Garrison's staff engaged in the investigation of the Kennedy assassi-

THREE OF Garrison's assistants. Louis Ivon, James L. Alcock and Numa Bertel, arrived shortly after 11 a. m., but refused to answer questions by newsmen. Present with Wegmann were three other Shaw attorneys, Edward Wegmann, Irvin F. Dymond

and Sal Panzeca.
William Wegmann also declined to comment except to say, "We will make no com-ment as long as this case is in federal court."

In his letter to his staff,

Garrison said:

"This is to inform you that the action of the United States District Court in blocking the Shaw trial and con-verting it into a fishing ex-pedition for the defense lawyers is absolutely illegal and is not supported by law or custom.

"The action by this federal court continues the obstruction and interference which we have received in this case from the outset, beginning with the unprecedented an-nouncement of the attorney general of the United States that the defendant had been 'cleared' and proceeding 'cleared' and proceeding through a series of federal actions too numerous to describe here."

Garrison then reiterated the progress of his investigation and his belief that persons connected with the Central Intelligence Agency were involved in the assassination of Kennedy in Dallas.

He continued:

We have no concern about answering any relevant ques-tions the defense lawyers may be able to think of, but these will be answered in the court of the state of Louisiana, where actual jurisdiction exists and not in a federal court which has seized the case without any legal right to do so."

Directing his staff members to identify themselves only, Garrison concluded:
"The position of this office

can be summed up very briefly: We are ready for trial in ly: We are ready for trial in this matter, we continue to be ready for trial and we strongly oppose this outra-geous federal intrusion into the processes of justice of a Louisiana court."
