

New Orleans DA Faces Court Contempt Move

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Attorneys for Clay L. Shaw charged yesterday that Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison has shown contempt for a federal court and should be ordered to obey the court's order.

Counsel for Shaw, who has been charged with conspiring to assassinate President John F. Kennedy, filed a 300-page document in U.S. District Court seeking to compel Garrison's aides to answer a set of questions to which they had refused to reply.

Judge Frederick J. R. Heebe was asked to set a hearing for June 19.

The requested hearing would be in addition to a hearing ordered earlier before a three-judge panel which will consider Shaw's charges that his constitutional rights have been violated by Garrison.

Judge Heebe granted a temporary restraining order June 4 barring further prosecution of Shaw by Garrison until the three-judge panel issued its findings.

Judge Heebe's order also gave Shaw's attorneys the right to take depositions from four of Garrison's aides.

Garrison ordered the four to tell the attorneys nothing more than their "name, office rank and social security num-

ber."

The attorneys met with the four aides last week to take depositions. The four gave little more information than that ordered by Garrison.

Shaw's attorneys yesterday asked Judge Heebe to order the DA's men to answer their questions and to pay \$3,000 in court costs for having to seek the order.
