Shaw Looks To Supreme Court

The legal fight to block state prosecution of Clay L. Shaw on a charge of conspiring to murder President Kennedy is headed for the United States Supreme Court.

The announcement of appeal was filed in U.S. District Court by Shaw's lawyers yes-

terday.

The move came shortly after State Criminal District Court Judge Edward A. Hag-gerty Jr., at District Attor-ney Jim Garrison's request, set September 10 as the new trial date in the long-delayed case.

However, Shaw's lawyers also filed a motion asking that Federal court block State prosecution until the Supreme Court rules on the

appeal.

The appeal is from a special three-judge Federal court's denial of an order blocking prosecution and re-fusal to (1) declare the War-ren Commisson report bind-ing on all U.S. courts, (2) rule the State conspiracy law unconstitutiona, and (3) order the U.S. Attorney General into the case.

Appeal from a three-judge panel go directly to the high court, bypassing the circuit court of appeals.

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
