Judges Robert A. Ainsworth Jr., James A. Comiskey and Frederick J. R. Heebe grant-ed the appeal staying the prosecution of Shaw pending the outcome of the appeal.

A special three-judge fed-ral panel today barred the istrict attorney's office from rosecuting a c c u s e d con-pirator Clay L Shaw until judges denied the request for an injunction against Garrison.

Attorneys for Shaw, after the decision, filed a notice with the court announcing

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their intention of appealing

the ruling. Meanwhile, Garrison's of-fice had set Sept. 10 as the date for the long-delayed trial of Shaw, who was indicted on the conspiracy charge in March, 1967, by the Orleans Parish Grand Jury. TODAY'S DECISION by

Comiskey means that the trial cannot begin in September be-cause the U.S. Supreme Court is in summer vacation and does not return until October. Shaw was the first person indicted in connection with Garrison's investigation into the November, 1963, assassi-nation of President Kennedy at Dallas, Tex.
