Rackets Unit Investigators Given Reprieve

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)— The State Labor - Management Commission of Inquiry has a 90-day reprieve on its investigative staff—and may intend to wind up its work during that time.

The State Civil Service Commission gave the anti - rackets group authority yesterday to put four investigators on the unclassified payroll for 90 days.

As unclassified workers, the investigators do not have to meet civil service requirements and — more important—are not limited by the civil service pay scale.

Postponed indefinitely was a hearing to probe the employment practices of the commission of inquiry, which has been probing alleged labor - management rackets in the Baton Rouge area for over a year.

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However, the Civil Service Commission reserved the right to call a hearing at any time on the agency's employment practices.

In making its decision, the Civil Service Commission took cognizance of Gov. John Mc-Keithen's certification that the four investigators would be temporary employes.

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The 90-day period sought by the commission of inquiry apparently means its work is nearing an end.
