Reagan Says No to Gari

Gov. Ronald Reagan refused today New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison's request to extradite Edgar Eugene Bradley to face charges of plotting the assas-sination of President Kenne-

Reagan, through his legal Secretary Edwin L. Meese III, said there was insufficient evidence to extradict Bradley, the 49-year-old West Coast representative for the Rev. Carl McIntyre, a right wing radio evangelist.

REAGAN SAYS NO

Garrison charged that Bradley, of North Hollywood, conspired "with others" to murder Kennedy. He asked California authorities to return Bradley to New Orleans to stand trial.

But Reagan said Louisiana failed to prove that Bradley had been in that state during August, 1963, when Garrison said the conspiracy began.

POLITICAL ENEMIES

Bradley and his attorney, George Jensen of Los Angeles, claim he was the victi mof a mysterious mixup of identification.

Bradley has said his polit-cal enemies might have rumped up the charge against him.

He said his enemies would like very much to do enything to harm me and tect the constitutional princi-ples of this country." He did not elaborate.

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Extradition Denied in Kennedy Probe

Governor Ronald Reagan refused yesterday to approve the extradition of Edgar Eugene Bradley to New Orleans to face trial on charges of plotting to kill the late President John F. Kennedy.

The decision, the governor said, was based upon an insufficient showing by New Orleans district attorney Jim Garrison that Bradley had been in Louisiana between August and November of

Bradley denied the charges and produced evidence at an extradition hearing last June that he had not been in Louisiana in 1963.
