AP - A Dal-las contractor said he was of-fered 55,000 for a \$10,000 build-ing the would-be buyer appar-ently knew contained an appoint-ment book belonging to the late Jack Ruby, the Dallas Times-Herald said today. The newspaper said the 22-year-old vestpocket booklet, found by accident in a false ceiling in the building, contained dozens of names, addresses and telephone numbers of persons across the country.

across the country. Ruby was the Dallas night-club owner who gunned down accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald in the Dal-las police station five years ago. Ruby died of cancer in January of 1966.

of 1966. The newspaper said the con-tractor, who asked that he not be identified, showed the ap-pointment book and other Ruby papers after he was located through an ad in the Times-Herald offering to sell the huby papers to the highest bidder. The contractor said he and his workmen were remodeling a building about a year ago when

building about a year ago when a tall, well-spoken man walked in and asked for the building's owner. The man never identified himself, the newspaper quoted

himself, the newspaper quoted the contractor as saying. "He called me aside and of-fered me 150,000 for the build-ing," the contractor said. "Or he said he would give me the same amount of money if I wouldn't reopen the place." Two days later, the Times Herald said. an electrician

Herald said, an electrician stringing new wiring discover-ed the false ceiling. Four boxes containing the Ruby papers were in a conner.

The mystery man returned within the week and was told the building was not for sale. "At his request, I let him have a look around,"" the con-tractor said. "He went straight to the false ceiling and looked in the same corner," the con-tractor said, but found nothing because the boxes had been re-moved. moved.

The would-be buyer then left without a word and never re-turned, the paper said. The contractor said he infor-med the Federal Bureau of In-vestigation of the materials but they indicated they were not interested.

Among the names mentioned in the appointment book is a reference to "Shaw." No further identification is noted. It says

Identification is noted. It says "Opening for Shaw." There is no evidence among the papers to suggest this refer-ence is in any way connected to the Clay Shaw that New Or-leans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison has charged with conspring to assassinate President Kennedy.
