

JUDGE BARS DELAY IN TRIAL OF SHAW

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 13 (UPI)—District Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. refused today to delay or move the scheduled Jan. 21 trial of Clay L. Shaw on charges of conspiring to assassinate President Kennedy.

Judge Haggerty denied defense motions to quash District Attorney Jim Garrison's charges against Shaw and for a change of venue to move the trial outside New Orleans.

Judge Haggerty said that he would release ground rules tomorrow for newsmen covering the trial. He had already rejected the same defense motions once before. He turned them down summarily today.

Mr. Shaw's attorney, F. Irvin Dymond, arguing for dismissal of the charges against Mr. Shaw, again attacked Louisiana's criminal conspiracy statute as unconstitutional.

The United States District Court in New Orleans rejected the same contentions in a suit Mr. Shaw filed to block Mr. Garrison from prosecuting him.

The United States Supreme Court, hearing the suit on appeal in December, agreed with the lower court not to intervene in a state prosecution and gave Mr. Garrison a green light to try Mr. Shaw.
