

Dallas Doctor Called in Shaw Trial

New Orleans

A doctor who treated wounded Governor John Connally of Texas was subpoenaed yesterday by district attorney Jim Garrison to testify at the trial of Clay L. Shaw, accused of conspiracy to assassinate President Kennedy.

He is Dr. Robert R. Shaw, who attended the stricken Connally after he was shot while riding in the presidential car in Dallas the day Kennedy was slain, November 22, 1963.

The Warren Commission found that the governor, who was seated in front of President and Mrs. Kennedy, was wounded by a bullet that had passed through Kennedy's body. However, critics of the commission maintain Connally was struck by another bullet.

Although he backs the commission's findings the governor also has maintained that he was not wounded by the bullet that struck Kennedy.

Another witness subpoenaed was James Altgens, an Associated Press photographer who took pictures of the assassination. His photographs are contained in the Warren Commission report.

Altgens testified before the commission that he had a good vantage point at the time of the shooting. He said he snapped one picture almost simultaneously with the firing of the first shot.

Yesterday's session of the trial was cut short when Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. ran out of potential jurors. Four jurors have been picked so far. A total of 12 jurors and two alternates are needed before the substantive part of the trial can begin.
