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Garrison May Try Again for X-Rays

District Attorney Jim Garrison's office further indicated yesterday the Clay L. Shaw trial may become a full-blown presentation of Garrison's theory that the "real facts" in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy have been suppressed.

Assistant district attorney James Alcock said a "pretty firm" decision had been made to renew the district attorney's request, turned down by a Washington judge, for photographs and X-rays of the Kennedy autopsy.

Shaw, the 55-year-old -re tired managing director of the New Orleans International Trade Mart, is charged with conspiring in 1963 to kill Kennedy.

The prosecution has pointed out to prospective jurors it has been questioning for the past nine days that it does not have to prove the alleged conspiracy resulted in the November 22, 1963, assassination in Dallas or even had any connection with it.

But the prosecution's ma-

neuvers increasingly indicated that was waht Garrison might try to do.

Garrison has subpoenaed several persons involved with the actual assassination, including Marina Oswalk Porter of Dallas, widow of alleged assassin Lee Harvey Oswalk, an FBI photographic expert, photographers who took pictures of the assassination scene and former Texas Governor John Connally, who was riding in the car with Kennedy and was wounded in the shooting.

Judge Charles E. Galleck Jr. of Washington two weeks ago turned down Garrison's request for the autopsy evidence. Alcock said yesterday the prosecution rpobably would present additional evidence of its need for the material.

With both prosecution and defense down to their last peremptory challenge — by which they can excuse jurors without giving a reason — selection of the 12th juror and two needed alternates was expecged quickly.

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
