Shaw Trial Now One Juror Short]

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 30— The regular jury panels of all eight divisions of the New Orleans Criminal Courts were exhausted today without the selection of a complete jury to try Clay L. Shaw on a charge of conspiring to murder President Kennedy in 1963.

Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. of the Criminal District Court ordered the names of 150 New Orleans residents to be drawn from those eligible for jury service, and deputies were told to serve summonses on them. The

new jurors are ordered to report to court tomorrow morning.

No additional jurors were agreed on today as lawyers went through the last of more than 600 jurors on the eight panels. Another 400 members of the panel have been chosen to serve in other trials or had been excused for personal reasons.

Eleven jurors have been agreed on by lawyers to try Mr. Shaw, a businessman from New Orleans. Testimony will begin after the 12th juror and two alternates are selected.
