

Subpoena for Film Of Kennedy Murder Issued by Garrison

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NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 4—District Attorney Jim Garrison subpoenaed today as possible evidence in the trial of Clay L. Shaw a color motion picture film of President Kennedy's assassination.

Mr. Shaw, a retired New Orleans businessman, is charged with conspiring to assassinate the President. A com-

mission headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren concluded that the President had been killed by two shots from behind fired by Lee Harvey Oswald acting alone.

The film, made by Abraham Zapruder, a Dallas clothing manufacturer, was bought by Life magazine for \$25,000. The Warren Commission said that an analysis of the film by film experts had indicated that a lone assassin could have fired the shots that killed President Kennedy and wounded John B. Connally Jr., then Governor of Texas.

Mr. Garrison has said that the reaction of the two men

as indicated by the film suggested that at least two assassins were firing at the Presidential party.

Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. said in Criminal District Court that he had not decided what evidence of the assassination scene would be allowed to be introduced in Mr. Shaw's trial.

Testimony in the trial, which began Jan. 21, will begin as soon as a second alternate juror is chosen. More than 120 prospective jurors were dismissed today without the second alternate being selected, and Judge Haggerty summoned 150 more jurors for tomorrow.
