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...and that it did not know if additional runways would be feasible.

The New York Times reported on Tuesday that some airline officials had revived a bay-runway plan and had given the Port Authority and other agencies briefings on it.

Garrison Hints Ouster Move

NEW ORLEANS, May 15 (AP) — District Attorney Jim Garrison says he will seek a third term unless the Federal Government can "fabricate" a case against him to have him removed. Mr. Garrison, first elected District Attorney in March, 1962, disclosed his plans last night at a meeting in the office of Assessor James E. Comiskey. He declined to elaborate on what he said were Government efforts to oust him from office, saying it would "involve too much speculation."

an exchange teacher in England, wrote fellow teachers here that he was unable to accept their gift of \$5.40 worth of smoking tobacco.

British customs demanded more than \$50 in duty, he explained.

L. E. Lowe, one of the teachers who sent the gift, wrote to the British Embassy protesting the charge.

A staff member of the embassy replied that the British duty on tobacco was \$11.55 a pound, and that British customs officers were only doing what American customs officials would do.

A United States customs officer said the American duty on tobacco was 17½ cents a pound, going up to \$2.27 a pound for leaf tobacco.

An undisclosed gift costing less than \$10 would normally be admitted duty free, the American customs man said.

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
