DA, Mayor Hit For 'Inaction' On N.O. Crime

Ivor A. Trapolin, chairman of the Mayor's Advisory Com-mittee on Crime and De-Initiee on Crime and De-linquency, has criticized Dis-trict Attorney Jim Garrison and Mayor Victor H. Schiro for not adequately attacking organized crime here.

Trapolin's committee issued a' "Report on Organized Crime" April 17 which stated that support for the conclu-sions of the report has come from state and federal levels of government but local load of government, but local lead-ers insist there is no or-ganized crime in New Or-

In a long message to Schiro; the Orleans Parish grand jury, and to members of the advisory committee, Trapolin said: "It should be of great sig-nificance to each member of sum committee that not

our committee that . . . not one person has pointed to one specific word, line or para-graph in our report with which they disagree. Mean-while, as far as I know, not one of our recommendations . . . has been put into effect." The report claims organized crime exists in New Orleans and asserts it is making in-

crime exists in New Orleans and asserts it is making in-roads into the tourist business of far city. Trapolin added that after his appearance before the grand jury, James Alcock, head of Garrison's organized crime unit, stated that "he doubted that the investigation would reach the proportions of the 1967 organized crime probe. In other words, he ex-pected little action to be taken either by his office or by the Orleans Parish grand jury."
