before 6 p.m. and left just before 6 p.m. Just before Kohn's appearance, Ross T. Scaccia, a candidate for district attorney, testified before the jury.

Scaccia formerly served as an assistant DA in charge of vice and as an assistant U.S. attorney.

DA Honored 'No-Harass' Pledge--Kohn

Aaron M. Kohn, managing director of the Metropolitan Crime Commission, said today the district attorney's office honored its pledge not to harass him in his appearance before the Orleans Parish Grand Jury yesterday.

Kohn denied he "unsuccessfully fought" the subpena to appear before the jury in its organized crime probe, as reported in yesterday's States-Item. He said his appearance was by agreement.

He said it is his impression that the current grand jury "is open-minded on the subject of organized crime and is sincerely attempting to be effective in the community interest."
