

BUGGED HOFFA FILE ORDERED BY JUDGE

CHATTANOOGA, Aug. 20 (AP)—Judge Frank Wilson of the United States District Court today ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation to produce transcripts of bugged conversation relating to the conviction of James R. Hoffa five years ago for jury tampering.

The order, which pertains to 1,317 transcripts in the so-called "June file," was issued on the second day of a hearing in which the former Detroit Teamster Union leader and three others sought to overturn their convictions on the ground that they were tainted with illegal wiretap evidence.

Morris Shenker, Hoffa's chief counsel, demanded that the entire file relating to Larry Campbell of Detroit, one of the appellants, be turned over to the defense lawyers.

Over government objections, the judge said he would study the file to determine if it contained information the defense should have.

Earlier Government lawyers had produced 254 transcripts of recorded conversations involving Campbell, and insisted these contained all pertinent information. Mr. Shenker said he was unwilling to take the government's word.

An F.B.I. official, Charles Bolz, had been pressed earlier for some information about the "June file," which he said under questioning contained a record of all conversations that the F.B.I. had "bugged" illegally.

Mr. Bolz, F.B.I. chief of accounting and records, disclosed the existence of the file—apparently for the first time—at the hearing yesterday.

DETROIT, Aug. 20 (AP)—Viola Hoffa, 79-year-old mother of James Hoffa, was in satisfactory condition in a hospital today, recovering from injuries suffered in a fall yesterday in her home. Her injury was tentatively diagnosed as a broken hip.
