

**HOFFA DENIED ACCESS
TO U.S. BUGGING FILES**

CHATTANOGA, Aug. 25 (UPI) — Attorneys for James R. Hoffa, Teamsters union president, lost today in their attempt to examine a secret record of Government eavesdropping on the union.

Federal Judge Frank Wilson ruled that documents in the so-called "June file" had no bearing on Hoffa's motion for a new trial on jury tampering charges.

The "June file," kept on record at the headquarters of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, is a top-secret record of all Justice Department eavesdropping in criminal cases.

Judge Wilson refused to turn over to Hoffa's lawyers most of 1,317 other documents dealing with Government eavesdropping on the teamsters in the Detroit area between 1961 and 1965.

He did insert into the court record documents from the Detroit investigation relating to routine conversations involving Larry Campbell, one of Hoffa's co-defenders.

Hoffa, who contends his constitutional rights were violated by Government bugging, has served 36 months of an eight-year sentence in the Federal Penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa.
