Connick referred to the case of Tait, the 21-year-old law student who says he was beaten and sexually assaulted during a 10-day stay in Parish Prison.

Connic made the statement today at a rally at 8400 Sycamore St.

CONNICK SAID Garrison is now promising "an investigation of conditions in Parish Prison but the investigation should have begun seven years ago when Garrison was first electured."

The candidate charged Garrison has never appeared before

today at a rally at 8400 Sycamore St.

THE CANDIDATE said the DA's office could have let Tait out on recognizance or released him under the committing magistrate system rather than "putching a young college student in a cell block with hardened criminals."

Connick charged "there is a parallel between the case of the City Council or any elected body to complain about conditions in Parish Prison.

"I promise that if I am elected I will work every day to do something about Parish Prison and to be certain there are no more Michael Francis Tait cases," Connick said.
