

candidate for Orleans Parish Coroner, Dr. Carl H. Ra-bin, said yesterday, "It is now and will continue to be my poli-cy that the office of coroner be conducted with dignity and compassion."

Dr. Rabin, who was appointed 14 months ago by Gov. John J. McKeithen to fill the remaining term of the late Dr. Nicho-las J. Chetta, told the Press las J. Chetta, told the Fress Club of New Orleans at a lunch-ye "There are d in the c f-eon yesterday, "There are no hard hearts in the coroner's of-

fice — no indifferent, callous or rude people."

"We do not forget that a death victim was a human being with loved ones," he said.

Dr. Rabin outlined improvements he said he began on taking office

ing office.
"First," he said, "the medical records of the Orleans Par-ish Coroner's Office are now available on a 24-hour basis.

"Second, I have increased

the speed in which we reach the scene of a fatality," he said.

Thirdly, he outlined the part the coroner's office plays in seeking direct action toward the solution of death due to narcotism.

A fourth improvement he cited was the relaying of death reports to news media as quick-ly as possible through an im-proved system of press commu-nication. "A well-informed pub-lic is a deterrent to crime," Dr. Rabin said.

A fifth point he explained is the close cooperation between the coroner's office and the de-

partment of police.

A sixth improvement Dr. Rabin cited was the fact that he

nabin cited was the fact that he uses his own car and does not charge his office for its upkeep.

Dr. Rabin promised, "If elected coroner on Nov. 8, it will be my intention to become the first full-time coroner in the history of New Orleans."
