## Gallinghouse Nixon Pick for U.S. Attorney

Gerald Gallinghouse, year-old New Orleans attorney and a former Democrat will be nominated as United States attorney for the East-ern District of Louisiana.

President Nixon said yesterday he will nominate linghouse to replace Louis C. LaCour, a Democrat. The nomination must have Senate approval.

The Rev. Avery C. Alexander, executive director of the New Orleans Advance-ment Association, said, "We are prepared to fight the nomination in the Senate, both before the appropriate com-

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mittee and, if necessary, on the floor."

In June, the Rev. Alexander said Gallinghouse's appointment "would disrupt the relationship between the black and white communities and alienate the black citizens and the good thinking whites from the Republican Party—perhaps forever."

Gallinghouse has denied the

Gallinghouse has denied the charge, saying, "As God is my witness, I have never said or done anything that would indicate there is any racism in me."

Gallinghouse said, "No law-abiding citizen or group of citizens have anything to be concerned about as far as I

am concerned.
"I will enforce all the laws, without regard to race, color or creed."

He said he hopes there will be no further opposition.

## Gallinghouse 'Sorry' About **Opposition**

Gerald Gallinghouse, whom President Nixon will nominate as U.S. attorney for eastern Louisiana, says he is "very sorry that any citizen would oppose the President's nomination of me to this important position of public trust.'

Gallinghouse, a New\_Or-Gallinghouse, a New Orleans attorney, former City Court judge and onetime president of the Orleans Levee Board, replied yesterday to charges by the Rev. Avery C. Alexander, executive director of the New Orleans Advancement Association, that the nominee "would disrupt the relationship between the black and white communities."

The 49-year-old nominee said, "I recognize the right of every person to express his own opinion on any public matter. But there is noting in my personal or public life that would indicate to any fair-minded person that I would ever discriminate against anyone because of tace, color or creed."
