The judge said his court is "virtually a 24-hour court," Pretrial conferences are con-ducted every week to assure firm trial dates and keep the docket current, he said. Judge Oser is a 1953 gradu-ate of Jesuit High School, where he was selected as an all pren and all-state tackle. He

court judge. In 1962, Judge Oser was ap-pointed an assistant district at-terney and rose to the position of executive assistant DA.

During this time, he served as a trial assistant, supervisor of narcotics and vice cases, su-pervisor of all capital cases and an advisor to the grand jury
