U.S. Official Hopes To Share Evidence

The Justice Department attorney coordinating a team of federal investigators studying evidence of organized crime activity in Louisiana said yes-terday he hopes to obtain the cooperation of the legislative investigating committee now probing allegations of Mafia influence in state government.

John Wall, speaking at a luncheon meeting of the New Orleans chapter of the Federal Bar Association, said the legislative committee hopefully will supply his staff with any evidence of federal law violations, and his task force will turn over to local authoritieis any evidence it finds of local law violations.

Wall promised his group "will be working hard and working full time" to eliminate any elements of organ-ized crime that may be operating in the New Orleans area. He added, however, that local government officials must bear primary responsibility for combatting crime.

He said the main targets of the federal investigation will be members of the Mafia and their associates, racke-teering labor and management officials and corrupt politicians.

New Orleans team, The which has an eight-year lease on its headquarters at 526 St. Louis, is one of 20 such groups in the nation planned by the Justice Department and the 13th to be set up so far.
