BATON ROUGE (AP) — A \$5,000 pay boost for district at-tornies has cleared the Legislature and rests on the governor's desk.

The House yesterday voted 83-18 to accept a conference committee report on the pay bill.

The House had refused earlier to concur in Senate amend-ments dealing with the pay of New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison, but accepted them when recommended by the con-formance committee ference committee.

The bill would provide an additional \$5,000 to the \$10,000 that the state currently pays annually to supplement DA pay. Garrison was only given a

\$2,100 raise in the original bill and the Senate amendment in-reased it to \$5,000.

Interim Keport Of Mob Probe Is Expected

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP)-An interim report was expected today on a legislative committee probe of Life magazine allegations that the Mafia pulls strings in state government.

strings in state government. The preliminary report was supposed to be completed by Saturday, but the committee chairman, Sen. Adrian G. Du-plantier of New Orleans, said he did not have time to finish it it.

"IT'S JUST going to be late," Duplantier said yesterday. The resolution creating the committee called for submis-sion of an interim report 20 days prior to adjournment of the session the session.

The committee has conducted two public hearings in the probe.

IN THE first hearing, Jeffer-son Parish Sheriff Alwynn Cronvich and New Orleans Police Supt. Joseph Giarrusso said or-ganized crime existed in their areas but did not flourish.

areas but did not flourish. Gov. John J. McKeithen told the committee in the second hearing that the Life article rep-resented "unmitigated lies." The panel also conducted a brief informal meeting with Da-vid L. Chandler, chief author of the April 10 Life article. Chan-dler gave the committee a pack-age of documents on his re.

The commietee declined to release the documents, but Chan-dler's attorney labeled them "explosive."

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
