WASHINGTON — James R.
Hoffa, imprisoned president of
the Teamsters Union, is again
seeking freedom on the basis

Hoffa today filed a new appeal with the U.S. Supreme
Court seeking to upset his
jury-tampering conviction and
eight-year prison term.

The central allegation in the appeal is that Ewing King, a codefendant, was the subject of illegal electronic eavesdropping. King, a former official of a teamsters local in Nashville, was convicted with Hoffa and two others and sent to prison.

The appeal said that a day before the indictment was returned and after King had been accused of the crime, a conversation between him and Partin, a secret government informer, was electronically overheard, recorded and transcribed.

Hoffa went to prison three years ago. Convicted with him and also appealing are Thomas Ewing Parks, a Nashville funeral home employe, and Larry Campbell, a Detroit teamster.
