BUTTE, Mont. (AP) – Bur-ly Wade McClanahan, a 36-year-old "strong arm" and trusted lieutenant of Edward Grady Partin, says he shot a construction worker at Pla-quemine on orders of Partin, a Louisiana Teamsters Union official.

The 36-year-old McClana-han, 6-feet-4 and 250 pounds, told a federal court jury he shot and wounded W. O. Bershot and wounded, w. O. Ber-geron, a contractor doing business with a competitor of convicted conspirator Ted F. Dunham Jr., after Partin in-structed him to create a dis-turbance at Bergeron's job site site.

McClanahan, charged with criminal conspiracy, described himself as a "trusted lieuten-ant of Partin" and testified about beatings, shootings, sa-botage and other means of "solving problems" for Par-tin tin.

McClanahan said he and the late Jerry Sylvester led an armed attack on the Plaquemine construction site. He

mine construction site. He said both men were members of Local 5 in Baton Rouge, paid dues, but had no duties other than strong-arm jobs as needed and ordered by Partin. The Plaquemine a tt a c k, McClanahan said, was at a job by Bergeron, who had bought concrete pipe from Ro-land Stevens of Baton Rouge. On Jan. 16 and 17, 1968, McClanahan said, he and Ed-

McClanahan said, he and Edgar Coleman of the Teamsters local hampered and obstruct-

local hampered and oushout ed the job. ON JAN. 18, Bergeron ig-nored the picketing and went to work, McClanahan said, while Partin organized the at-tack at the Teamsters Hall at Poton Rouge Baton Rouge.

Partin said, "'Run them out of there," McClanahan testified.

"We done what he said," the witness added. "We put a pretty good whuppin' on 'em." The witness admitted he

shot one man, a heavy equipment operator, who was wounded in the leg. W. D.

Previously, Judge W. D. Murray had instructed the ju-

rors that McClanahan under federal law is immune from prosecution for any act ad-mitted in the course of his present testimony.
