

## Arrest For Garrison Set Monday

Arrest of Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison and nine other men on bribery, conspiracy and gambling charges has been set for Monday before Criminal Dist. Court Judge Malcolm V. O'Hara, a former political foe of the DA's.

Garrison earlier this week asked the Orleans Parish

Grand Jury to indict him and the others on essentially the same charges now being investigated by a federal grand jury. The indictments against Garrison, two former policemen and seven pinball figures charge bribery, conspiracy to commit bribery, gambling and conspiracy to commit gambling.

The same men are named in a 110-page affidavit, based on information supplied by a former Garrison investigator, Pershing Gervais, and others, which federal officials used in the 10 arrests June 30.

GARRISON HAS said he will request the appointment of a special prosecutor to handle the case in court.

Garrison was in O'Hara's court yesterday to file a motion for the recusal of his office from prosecution of the case.

O'Hara ran an unsuccessful race against Garrison for district attorney in 1965.

The bribery charges are felonies, punishable with or

without hard labor; the gambling charges are misdemeanors.

The federal grand jury investigating the case was empaneled Aug. 2 for an 18-month term and must return indictments before further federal action can be taken against the defendants. Yesterday, U.S. Atty. Gerald J. Gallinghouse said the federal investigation goes far beyond the allegations contained in the state indictments.

THERE HAS BEEN some speculation about whether the defendants, following disposal of the state's case, could be protected from federal prosecution on the grounds of double jeopardy.

The federal affidavit alleges that Garrison; Capt. Frederick A. Soule Sr., former vice squad commander and investigator in the DA's office; and Sgt. Robert N. Frey, vice squad commander received bribes to protect the pinball interests.
