Venue Hearing son Set Tomorrow for

District Atty. Jim Garrison and nine others accused of public bribery and gambling in pinball operations will re-ceive a Criminal District Court hearing tomorrow on requests that their case be mov-

ed out of New Orleans. The 10, who were scheduled to be arraigned yesterday be-fore Judge Malcolm V. O'Hara, asked that the court grant them a change in venue on grounds they could not receive a fair trial here.

F. Irvin Dymond, one of the defense attorneys, furnished the court with a list of circulation figures by parish for The States-Item and The Times-Picayune. SHORTLY BEFORE sched-

uling the hearing for 10 a. m. tomorrow, O'Hara named at-torney Benjamin E. Smith, known primarily for civil rights work, to be special prosecutor for the case, re-

placing Garrison's office. Garrison and his co-defendants were first charged June ants were first charged June 30 when federal agents ac-cused the prosecutor of ac-cepting funds to protect the pinball industry here. They have not been indicted by a federal grand jury, which is required before they can be taken to federal court taken to federal court.

Garrison in turn asked the Orleans Parish Grand Jury to indict him on the same

charges, and it did. There has been speculation U. S. Atty. Gerald Gallinghouse will seek removal of the

case to the federal courts, but partment. no such action has been taken and no representatives of his office were present at yester-day's brief session. Gallinghouse has refused to comment on the case.

CHARGED ALONG with the district attorney were police Capt. Frederick A. Soule Sr., who was on the district attor-ney's staff, and Sgt. Robert N. Frey, former head of the vice squad. Both men have been fired from the Police De-

partment. Other defendants are John J. Elms, a partner in TAC Amusement Co.; Louis M. Boasberg, New Orleans Nov-elty Co.; Lawrence J. La-garde, TAC Amusement, Har-by S. Marks, an employe of New Orleans Novelty; Robert Mims, a principal stockholder in REN Enterprises; John Aruns Callery, a lobbyist for the pinball industry, and John Elmo Pierce, owner of Pierce Amusement Co. Amusement Co.

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
