A July 17 hearing on the bribes from pinball operators Gervais recently changed his story and charged he was forced to entrap Garrison through harassment by the

postpone the hearing came at

the end of a hearing yesterday on a motion by defense attorneys seeking certain information they claim is necessary for their preparation for

the hearing. U.S. Atty. Gerald J. Galling-house agreed to supply the de-fense with some information, and Christenberry granted the motion only to his extent. Defense attorneys, not oppos-ing the continuance, said they need time to study the infor-mation to be sumplied by the mation to be supplied by the government.

Gallinghouse agreed to file with the clerk of court under seal, a copy of all tapes and one copy of all transcripts of the tapes in the government's the tapes in the government's possession, obtained by any means of electronic surveil-lance or tape recording or monitoring of conversations between Gervais and other p e r s o n s between January, 1966, and June 30, 1971, when Gervais left New Orleans. Gallinghouse said the gov-

Gallinghouse said the gov-ernment will also file copies of memoranda of interviews between Gervais and federal agents and copies of memo-randa of interviews between Gervais and attorneys for the New Orleans Strike Force of the Justice Department dur-ing the same period. The prosecutor asked 30

days to assemble the material.
