

Other Actions By High Court

Washington

The Supreme Court took these other actions yesterday:

police

Military

Declined to accept an action by six Air Force reserve officers seeking \$264,000 in damages for their illegal recall to active duty in 1968.

Ecology

Remanded to a lower court a challenge against the construction of a 34-mile scenic highway within the Santa Fe National Forest.

Harassment

Refused to consider setting aside a court order barring Jim Garrison, district attorney of New Orleans, from bringing a perjury prosecution against Clay Shaw in connection with the latter's acquittal on grounds of conspiring in the assassination of President Kennedy.

Safety

Declined to review a Massachusetts law requiring motorcycle riders to wear protective headware.

Indians

Held that more than \$7 million in oil royalties from a piece of property in Utah should be developed to the welfare of the entire Navajo tribe in the state and not merely the 1500 residents of the land.

Religion

Declined to review a lower court decision that required a member of the Seventh-Day Adventist church to join a union, despite his religious belief in freedom of choice, when he works at a plant with a union shop contract.

Schools

Set aside a decision that grade school pupils could be deprived of school books if they could not afford a \$7.50 fee.

Assembly Passes Bill for Study Of Quentin Uses

Sacramento

A study of possible recreational uses of the San Quentin Prison site would be required before the facility could be disposed of under a bill passed by the Assembly yesterday.

The measure by Senator Peter H. Behr (Rep-Tiburon), was returned to the Senate for concurrence in Assembly amendments on a 67 to 0 vote.

San Quentin is scheduled to be phased out beginning in 1975. The bill requires a state study of possible public uses, especially recreational, of the prison by June 30, 1974.
