RALLY

At a late evening news conference with thousands of demonstrators massing in the nation's capital for a big peace rally today, Mr. Nixon said he was not surprised at the intensity of the protests his decision prompted. But

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e said they would not affect is policies in Indochina.

He sounded a conciliatory ote toward opponents of his olicy and said he appreciatd the feelings that prompted ham to demonstrate.

"Those who protest want eace, they want to reduce asualties and they want to norten the war," Mr. Nixon aid.

ACCORD

Speaking with obvious motion and unusually solmn, Mr. Nixon said he greed "with everything" ne student demonstrators are "trying to accomplish."

But he said his decision to end troops into Cambodia vould serve the goals of the tudents, which he said was he same as his own—peace in Southeast Asia.

"Everything I stand for is vhat they want," Mr. Nixon aid of the protestors. "I unlerstand what they want. I vould hope they understand vhat I want."

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
