

She would like to send units for instruction in such countries as South Vietnam, Thailand and even the United States.

Laos Offers a Precedent

There is precedent for such military assistance in the case of Laos. Many of her best units have been trained in Thailand with the help of American instructors.

Such training would involve American weapons, since both South Vietnam and Thailand are equipped almost exclusively by the United States. Cambodia would like to end her dependence on Chinese and Sowiet arms, particularly because of the difficulties in procuring ammunition.

Officials note unhappily that the most substantial military aid received here so far has been shipments of Chinesemade automatic rifles captured by allied forces in South Vietnam. If no help is forthcoming, the sources said, Cambodia is prepared to buy arms and equipment, particularly artillery and armor, anywhere, including the United States.
