

Vietnamese Communists, at Paris Talks,

PARIS, June 4—The Vietnamese Communist delegates, speaking at today's session of the Vietnam peace talks, denounced President Nixon's address last night on Cambodia and expressed satisfaction at the opposition in the United States to his Asian policies.

No apparent progress toward a settlement was made at the four-hour meeting in the former Majestic Hotel here. It was one of the shortest of the 69 sessions held so far.

The Vietcong representative at the session, Nguyen Van

Thien, said: "Mr. Nixon has not ceased to invent imaginary victories, describing the devastation of Cambodia and the killing of Cambodians by G.I.'s as real achievements."

In his prepared remarks, Mr. Thien said that Mr. Nixon was trying "to deceive public opinion and appease the protest movement, which is mounting vigorously all over the United States."

In separate statements before and during the session, Mr. Thien and Hanoi's representative, Nguyen Minh Vy, cited the Nixon speech as evidence of what they termed

Washington's aggressive intentions in Indochina.

The United States representative at the session, Philip C. Habib, quoted from the President's address after having told the Communists that they were continuing to repeat unfounded charges of United States aggression in Indochina. Mr. Habib blamed the enemy for the fruitlessness of the talks, as he has often done in the past.

Going further, Saigon's representative, Nguyen Xuan Phong, said that the Communists must start to negotiate seriously or face "the increasing threat of a widened war."

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Denounce Nixon's Address

Mr. Phong, his delegation's deputy leader, did not say how Saigon thought the war might be widened. He was replacing his delegation's chief, Pham Dang Lam, who was said to have a heavy cold.

Mr. Lam's absence meant that all four of the representatives who spoke today had the rank of acting chief delegate in the absence of senior men.

Hanoi Replies to Nixon

HONG KONG, June 4 — North Vietnam replied today to President Nixon's speech by saying that "his insolent threat

to the Vietnamese people can cow nobody." It pledged continued warfare "against the United States aggressors" until complete victory.

The reply was heard here this evening in a broadcast over the Hanoi radio.

The broadcast said: "It is clear that Nixon and company are continuing their aggression against Cambodia" as they have been doing in South Vietnam and Laos.

Denying Mr. Nixon's statement that the American move into Cambodia had been the most successful of the war, the radio said that on the con-

trary, "the United States aggressor troops and South Vietnamese mercenaries have been beaten black and blue by the Cambodian people and national liberation armed forces."
