Ky to Lead 'Next Raid'

Washington

Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky expressed regret yesterday that the United States commando raid in North Vietnam failed to free prisoners of war and pledged he will lead Vietnamese volunteers in the next attempt to free them.

The South Vietnamese official said that if prisoners of war cannot be freed by the channel of negotiations. "then it is your duty to use every measure available to free them."

Ky spoke at a jammde luncheon meeting of the National Press Club after he had met with PresidenN txion and his top advisers at the White House for more than three hours.

He was afforded extraordianry security protection as he drove throug downtown Washington to the press club building.

Some 100 policemen guarded the building where about 70 anti-war demonstrators chanted slogans and waved Viet Cong flags when Ky arrived for his luncheon address.

"Ky go home!" they shouted as his limousine pulled up to the curb. But Ky, wearing a tan leather coat in Washington's first cold wave of the season, only nodded and smiled at photographers.
