The largest ground engagement involving American troops yesterday was said to have occurred at an enemy bunker complex discovered by helicopter-borne troops in the Cambodian border area about 56 miles northwest of Saigon. Eight enemy soldiers were killed in an attack on the American unit, a United States military spokesman said. He said 16 Americans were wounded.

The next truce period will come Jan. 26, when the Lunar New Year, or Tet, is celebrated. The allies are expected to announce a one-day or possibly a two-day truce. The enemy is already committed to a threeday truce.

## First Withdrawal of 1971

SAIGON, Jan. 1 (AP) - The United States command announced the first troop redeployment of the new year. It said authorized American troop strength was reduced by 170 men with the withdrawal of an Army air supply company.

Under the sixth phase of American withdrawal, United States troop strength is scheduled to drop to 284,000 by May 1, a decrease of 53,800 from the present total of 337,900 men.

## Warning by Thieu

SAIGON, Jan. 1 (UPI)-President Nguyen Van Thieu of South Vietnam in a speech to members of the diplomatic corps who came to bring him New Year's greetings, said he believed any peace agreement with the Vietcong would be worthless unless the Communist movement in South Vietnam was first rooted out and destroved.

"In fact," he said, "experience has shown, as in Laos, that there is no genuine peace even if the Communists sign a peace agreement based on their own proposals, unless the Communist infrastructure is eradicated, the Communist aggressive forces eliminated, and their staging areas from across the borders destroyed."
