RAID SOUTH OF HANOI MAY HAVE HIT MIG'S

SAIGON, South Vietnam, Saturday, April 24 (AP) — The United States command said today that American jets, striking at North Vietnamese missile sites around an air base 125 miles south of Hanoi on Thursday, might have damaged one or two MIG fighter planes on the ground.

A spokesman said two anti-aircraft positions were knocked out in the "protective reaction" attack, which was ordered after enemy gunners had fired at an American reconnaissance plane attempting to photograph the MIG base. It is the border between, situated at Quanlong, 185 miles north of the demilitarized zone that straddles the two Vietnams.

In the northern quarter of South Vietnam, meanwhile, the allied search for enemy troops and supply concentrations in and around the Ashau Valley went into its 11th day without significant contact reported.

In Saigon, the United States command announced the start of the seventh phase of President Nixon's troop withdrawal program a week early. It had been scheduled to start May 1,

when the manpower level was supposed to be at 284,000.

Official sources said troop cutbacks were from 10,000 to 15,000 ahead of schedule.
