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SENATORS ASK CURB ON U.S. ROLE IN ASIA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (UPI)

— Two Senators announced separate plans today to prevent the United States from getting more deeply involved in Laos and Cambodia.

Senator Stuart Symington, Democrat of Missouri said he would ask the Senate to cut 60 per cent from the \$490.2-million that the United States was spending in an "undeclared and uncontrolled war" in Laos. His amendment, offered on the \$21-billion military procurement bill, would impose a \$200-million ceiling on spending and would require four reports a year from the Administration on United States activities in Laos.

Senator Clifford P. Case, Republican of New Jersey, said he would introduce an amendment to the foreign aid bill to put "an absolute ceiling" of 100 military men and 50 civilians on the number of Americans who could be assigned to Cambodia.

Mr. Case said he was "increasingly alarmed" by reports that a military equipment team sent to Cambodia to handle foreign aid shipments had been increased to 50 and that the Pentagon wanted 50 more. He said there were 47 American civilians assigned to the embassy now, and 84 permanent and 15 temporary duty military personnel in Cambodia.

Mr. Symington said in a speech prepared for delivery to the Senate that for 10 years the Government has kept secret the extent of its involvement in the war between the Royal Lao Army, backed by American-supported Thai "volunteers," and the Pathet Lao forces, backed by the North Vietnamese.
