SFChronicle No Rush To Empty Orphanages

Despite prospects that Saigon might be engulfed by the war1 the registered adoption agencies operating here have decided to evacuat only those orphans who have parents already assined abroad, the head of one of the largest agencies said yesterday.

"We are not going to attempt to empty out the orphanages" of the 18,000 to 20,000 children now in registered institutions im Saigon, said Bob Chamness, director of the Holt Relief Agency based in Eugene, Ore.

The agencies have moved up fheir schedules, he said, but they "met yeserday and decided to send out onl the children from one orphanage in Vietnam to another in the United States. "We want to keep on operating here, whatever happens," Chamness said.

Of the 18,000 to 20,000 children in 125 registered or phanages in Saigon, about 700 were of mixed race, Chamness said. Most of these had American fathers of which about 275 were black.

He said many children we're i'l o' handicapped, with afflictions ranging from malnutrition to polio and cleft palates.

Chamness and other directions tors said their orphanages had been besieged by Vietnamese mothers with racially mixed children whom they were anxious to get to America.

"They are frantic and une of sure of what the future holds ... but if a mother comes of wit a child, we won't necessary

sarily take it," he said, explaining that social workers. must screen out those who would benefit by adoption."
