A 57 to 29 per cent majority of Americans resists sending more U.S. military aid to Vietnam and Cambodia, even if such assistance "would avoid a bloodbath for the people on thse countries."

Between April 1 and 4 the Harris Survey asked a cross-section of 1,522 adults nationwide:
