**Hanoi Says Communists Raided  
Saigon Airport With U.S. Planes**

HONG KONG, May 8 (Reu-  
ters — North Vietnam made  
public an account today of  
what it described as one of the  
South Vietnamese Communists'  
boldest exploits in the last  
days of the Vietnam war — the  
bombing of Saigon's Tan Son  
Nhut airport by captured Unit-  
ed States built planes.

On the day of the raid, April  
28, there were conflicting re-  
ports about the bombing of the  
airport. The attack coincided  
with the installation of Presi-  
dent Duong Van Minh and  
aroused speculation in some  
quarters that "hawk" generals  
were warning him against ca-  
pitulating to the Communists.

Former Premier Nguyen Cao  
Ky said he believed the planes  
had been captured at Da Nang  
and were flown by Communist

pilots during the Tan Son Nhut  
raid.

The North Vietnamese press  
account said that when Sai-  
gon's forces collapsed in the  
north and the Central High-  
lands in March, the Commu-  
nists captured five United  
States-built A-37 fighter-bomb-  
ers.

The Communists trained pi-  
lots to fly the planes and, in  
the last days of the war they  
flew to attack Tan Son Nhut.

When they arrived over the  
base, the control tower opera-  
tors became confused and  
asked the A-37's for identifica-  
tion, the report said.

Not until the planes had  
dropped their first bombs did  
the tower operators realize the  
airport was under attack.

The surrender of the South  
Vietnamese government came  
just two days after the raid.
