Mrs. Nhu Scores U.S. War Role

Once known variously as the First Lady of South Vietnam and the Dragon Lady, Mrs. Ngo Dinh Nhu made her first public appearance in this country since her husband and his bachelor brother, President Ngo Dinh Diem, were assassinated in 1963. "Vietnam has fallen many times but that does not mean it is forever—this will be the shortest time," Mrs. Nhu said on the NBC-TV "Tomorrow" show broadcast early yesterday morning.

She charged that the Kennedy Administration had intervened when "we were winning" as a "prestige" and "partisan" advantage "for the Democratic party." Mrs. Nhu said she might visit Washington before she and her 15-year-old daughter return to their home in Rome. NBC-TV said Mrs. Nhu was paid \$1,200 for the "Tomorrow" program, which is not under the network's news department.

 Nguyen Cao Ky, the former Premier of South Vietnam who is now at Camp Pendleton, Calif., as a refugee, has been invited by a trustee of Sacramento's three community colleges to apply for the post of superintendent. The salary is \$46,000 a year. The chairman of the trustees said, however, that the invitation was not official.

Near San Antonio, Tex., where Mr. Ky has said he might like to get into farming, several farmers said they were willing to discuss sponsoring him but questioned whether he thought it would be easy. A vegetable grower said the only jobs available were picking and planting, "and I don't think Ky is looking for that kind of work."
